Hundreds of residents came out to enjoy our family fun days this summer. Sadly our event at Regents Park was cancelled due to muddy conditions after heavy rain, but the sun shone on the Bourne Estate and Talacre Park and saw residents of all ages taking part in activities

to celebrate 100 years since women got the vote. It was the first tenant engagement event at the Bourne Estate since construction completed and the new facilities opened. Activities included rosette making, pop up suffragette plays, a huge range of sports, crafts and games as well as fantastic music and dance performances.

Council staff were on hand and enjoyed speaking to lots of you about the local services available including healthy living, housing options and recycling, and the London Fire Brigade gave tips on preventing fires and staying safe.

You said, we did:

Access to meters in communal electrical intake cupboards had to be restricted following guidance from the Health and Safety Executive.

You said: Some of you said that since these restrictions have been in place, you haven't been able to read your meter yourself and your energy provider has not

been prepared to take a reading for you.

We did: We know that this has been causing problems for some of our residents so we asked your energy suppliers to move their meters from our intake cupboards, but we have had very little cooperation. It is important that your meter is read safely so we are employing two officers to take your meter readings. This is a pilot and we will report back to you on how this service develops.

Help us to make your homes safer

As we've told you in previous newsletters, Camden Council are carrying out fire risk assessments (FRAs) across the borough. These are essential surveys that need to happen to make sure that you, your family and your neighbours are safe – **and we need your help to do them**. Please look out for letters requesting access to your home and keep to your appointment to allow us to get in and carry out these tests which will help keep everyone safer.

Photographic ID is always carried by both contractors and council staff, don't let anyone into your home without the relevant ID.




Investment near you

Communal decoration and flooring works are planned at hundreds of blocks across Camden as part of our borough-wide spring clean. This will see communal and entrance areas being improved in the blocks identified by residents and caretakers as needing it most.

Spring cleaning works have started in **College Place Estate** and will include replacing the existing mismatched and broken floor tiles with new porcelain floor tiles on this 1960s estate, while all of the communal staircase walls and ceilings are being freshly painted with fire resistant paint.

Things are about to get better for residents living in **Mornington** and **Arlington Street estates** as work to decorate the staircase and install new porcelain floor tiles will start soon.

Council homes for Camden Street

Tenants moved into 14 brand new homes on Camden Street over the summer. The new block marks the completion of the next phase of the Community Investment Programme's development in the area, the scheme having previously delivered the new St Pancras Community Centre and sports pitches shared with Richard Cobden School.

Now that construction is complete, the community can start accessing the full potential of improvements to the area, securing affordable homes for local people.

The block has been named Brayshaw House to commemorate former Somers Town and St Pancras councillor Peter Brayshaw and will be officially opened later in the month.

Enthusiastic volunteers are invaluable during an emergency, and we know that in our Camden community there are many people who have useful skills and experience that they would like to be able to share in an emergency situation.

Now, a new and innovative emergency volunteer programme has been launched in Camden that will enable local people to register their skills to help in a time of emergency. Delivered by Volunteer Centre Camden, the CAMERA (Coordinating and Mobilising Emergency Response Activists) programme, funded by the Government and Nesta, will allow local people who have useful skills and experience, like counselling, languages or first aid, to be known and trusted to the local authority to be called upon in the event of an emergency.

Mythbusting: sheltered housing

There are 774 residents in our 23 sheltered housing schemes in Camden, but not everyone is aware of exactly what sheltered housing is. Often, people think that moving to sheltered housing is like moving to a residential home, when in fact, it is the very opposite. Here we dispel the myths about sheltered housing...

Myth:

I will lose my secure tenancy ✘

I will lose my privacy and independence ✘

I will have to share facilities with other people ✘

I will not be allowed to bring my pet ✘

I will be treated like an old person and lose my voice ✘

Reality:

Sheltered housing is a supportive housing environment for older people. Residents all have a secure tenancy with their own front door, and live in a home

that is safe and well maintained. Residents have support and assistance – for example to book medical appointments or pay for utilities – while living a private and independent life, with a 24 hour alarm service and a housing manager who lives onsite.

Residents can choose to take part in a range of social events onsite and in the community to meet new people, as well as keeping in touch with old friends and family. Furry and feathered friends welcome.

Applying for school places – don't miss the deadlines

Parents whose children are moving up to secondary school next year have until 31 October 2018 to apply for a year 7 place. Camden has some of the highest performing schools in the country.

Find out more about what Camden secondary schools can offer your child at our schools' open days and evenings in September and October, or attend an informal session at your local Meet the

Parents group to find out what your local secondary schools are really like from parents of secondary school children as well as the students themselves.

For children moving from nursery up to primary schools, the deadline to apply for a reception place for your child starting in September next year is 15 January 2019.

Our town hall is closed for refurbishment

Our 80-year old town hall closed last month as part of a refurbishment project to modernise the building.

A planning application to refurbish the town hall will be submitted this autumn. If the application is successful, works will begin. All services have been relocated while the town hall is closed.

Birth and death registrations, electoral services, duplicate certificate applications and citizenship ceremonies have moved to the Crowndale Centre, 218 Eversholt Street, NW1 1BD. The council chamber, committee rooms and services, councillors' offices and the Mayor's office

and parlour are also at the Crowndale Centre.

The following services are available at Tavistock House, Tavistock Square, WC1H 9JB: nationality checking service, settlement checking service, nationality document return service, European passport return service and taking notice for marriages and civil partnerships.

Two brand new ceremony suites for wedding and civil ceremonies are also available at Tavistock House.

What happens if I want to end my joint tenancy?

Many of our tenants have joint tenancies with a partner or spouse. Sometimes unfortunately these relationships will break down and one partner or tenant will leave. If this happens and either you or your partner leaves, there can be legal implications so it's important that you tell us so that we can help as soon as possible.

If your partner leaves, get in touch with us straight away so that we can tell you about your rights and responsibilities, rent and payment, and help to transfer the tenancy to you if appropriate.

If you want to leave your home and bring your joint tenancy to an end, this is possible as only one tenant is needed to end it. Please get in touch with us before you take this step so that we can advise you and help to grant a tenancy in just your name.
