Camden Local Plan at public examination

The Council submitted the Camden Local Plan Proposed Submission Draft to the government for public examination in October 2025. At the examination a Planning Inspector considers whether the Plan is legally compliant and ‘sound’ (that is, has been positively prepared, is effective, is the most appropriate strategy and is consistent with national policy).

Public hearing sessions were held online in May and June 2026. These gave the Inspector an opportunity to ask the Council questions about the Plan and hear the views of residents and other stakeholders who had made representations during consultation on the Draft Plan.

Following the hearings, the Inspector wrote to the Council with a set of actions, and the Council is currently in the process of responding to them. All material relating to the examination is in the [examination library](#) on the [examination webpages](#).

If, in considering the Plan and representations made during the hearings and submitted in writing, the Inspector finds that changes (‘modifications’) to the Plan are necessary, these will be published for public consultation. Following this, the Inspector will issue their final report.

Euston Area Plan nears submission for examination

The Council is preparing to submit the [updated Euston Area Plan \(EAP\)](#) for public examination by a Planning Inspector in September 2026. The examination will include public hearing sessions involving those who objected to the Submission Draft EAP and other participants invited by the Inspector.

Submission of the Plan follows, and takes account of, consultation on proposed updates to the EAP in early 2023, a ‘direction of travel’ supplementary consultation in Summer 2024, and consultation on the proposed submission draft of the [EAP Update \(regulation 19\)](#) in early 2026.

The EAP is a long term planning framework to guide transformational change in the Euston area. It sets out Camden’s vision for the future of Euston and the expectations for how new homes, jobs, green spaces and community facilities should be delivered. The current EAP was adopted in 2015 and the review updates the document to reflect changes in policy position, design and priorities.



Neighbourhood Planning news

Kilburn Neighbourhood Plan adopted

The Kilburn Neighbourhood Plan, which covers parts of Camden and Brent, has been adopted by the Council. There are now eight adopted neighbourhood plans across the borough.

After successfully passing independent examination, the Neighbourhood Plan was subject to a local referendum in December 2025, where it was supported by 88% of those voting.

The Council adopted the Plan on 2 March 2026 and it is now being used by both boroughs in making planning decisions in the Kilburn Neighbourhood Area.

The Plan focuses on promoting public realm improvements, high quality design and mixed uses along Kilburn High Road. It also seeks to support creative industries, markets and social and community facilities in the area.

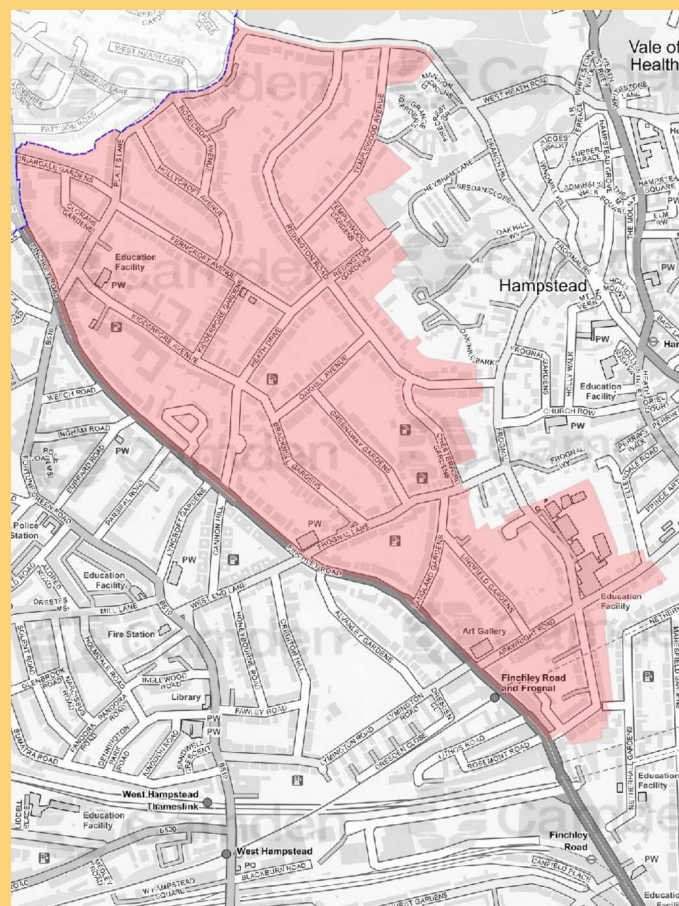

Consultation on the draft London Plan

The Mayor of London has launched a public consultation on the draft London Plan – the capital's long-term strategy for how London will grow and develop over the next 20 years.

The London Plan forms part of all London borough's development plans, meaning that we need to take it into account alongside our own planning policies when we make decisions on planning applications.

The London Plan sets Camden's future housing target and has policies on housing, design, supporting sustainable economic growth, climate change, green space, transport and infrastructure.

The consultation is open from **16 July until 5:00 pm on 15 October 2026**.

Draft Camden Town Vision consultation launched

Consultation on the draft Camden Town Vision is now open and runs until **23 August 2026**.

Last summer, we built a vision for the future of Camden Town with the valuable input of the local community. The engagement findings emphasised that the key ambition is revitalising and sustaining Camden Town's culture and identity, ensuring it remains a place that is creative, diverse, and unique.

Since then, we have been working on a draft vision for Camden Town which is intended to steer investment and collaboration to build on Camden Town's strengths and retain its unique character. This is a 10-year strategy that sets out aspirations, principles and spatial strategies to help create a vibrant, safe, welcoming and sustainable Camden Town. It also includes a Project Framework and, with the community's help, we want to use this to develop a Delivery Plan.

In the consultation we are asking if we have identified the right priorities, what we should be focussing on, and how we can work together for the future of Camden Town.
